SAN PEDRO STUDENTS FIND NEW FRIENDS IN WILMINGTON

In November, Isla Bonita and San Pedro Roman Catholic Primary School agreed to participate in a Pen Pal Exchange with Forest Hills Global Elementary School and Cape Fear Academy. Third and fourth grade classes along with the After School Spanish Club at Forest Hills will be exchanging letters through the remainder of the school year. The After School Spanish Club will be a bi-lingual exchange, the first of this type between Wilmington and a sister city school.

“PAINT DONCASTER”

There was an art opening on September 29 in a Georgian Town House in Bass Terrace on Thorne Rd. in central Doncaster. What was unusual about this particular show – a connection to Wilmington, N.C. Andrea Bretherton, owner of BrevonArt Gallery, hosted a judged exhibit of paintings in collaboration with Walls Gallery in Wilmington. Andrea worked with Nancy Marshall and David Leadman, owners of Walls Gallery in planning her exhibition of landscape paintings. The artist that placed best in the show would be considered for an opportunity to participate in “Paint Wilmington” – an

annual event that gathers accomplished painters from across the country for a week-long residency.

A panel of three judges selected Janet Samson’s painting, “Stocking Stall.” Janet studied painting at Manchester College of Art and received her Masters degree at Leeds Metropolitan University. Afterwards she spent 3 years doing landscape painting in Scotland. More recently her work has taken a more political direction involving large canvases focusing on environmental issues. Janet and Andrea were invited to be part of “Paint Wilmington” this November but were unable to participate at this time. RE-ESTABLISHING TIES WITH BARBADOS

SCC member and SCAW President, Marilyn Cantarella’s arrival in Barbados coincided with the island-wide celebration of Independence Day. While government offices were closed on November 30 for the official holiday Cantarella attended the opening of the Conference of the Museums Association of the Caribbean. The conference provided an excellent opportunity to mingle with members of the international and Barbadian arts/cultural community. No Boundaries International artist-in-residence (2006 alumni), Neville Crawford, welcomed Cantarella to Barbados and as member of the Barbados Art Council was instrumental in aiding her in the participation of conference special events and introducing her to many people in the local arts and humanities network.

Later in the week meetings were held with government officials to discuss the relationship between Wilmington and Bridgetown. Given the size of the country and the absence of local governments, Parliament recently passed legislation to develop constituency councils. The model will provide a vehicle for sister cities to establish education, arts, and professional exchanges. In addition to Wilmington, Bridgetown is also twinned with Bridgetown in Nova Scotia. Permanent Secretary of the Ministry responsible for Constituency Empowerment, Sonja Welch, defined the councils during the meeting - “A Constituency Council is a legally established body of local representatives,

who have been appointed and given the authority to voice the concerns of the residents of the Constituency; to maintain links with the Government and other agencies; and to effectively and efficiently manage resources for the development of the given Constituency". The Bridgetown Constituency Council members have been selected and following passage during the 2010 session of Parliament, the Bridgetown Council will be able to begin a dialogue with Wilmington's Sister City Commission and work together to plan future exchange activities.

PRESIDENT OBAMA HIGHLIGHTS IMPORTANCE OF SISTER CITIES MOVEMENTS

During today's town hall meeting with college students in Shanghai, China President Obama highlighted the impact the sister cities movement has on improving issues that affect Chinese and American cities alike. When asked about the sister city relationship between Chicago, IL and Shanghai, China the President had this to say, "We have seen what is possible when we build upon our mutual interests and engage on the basis of mutual respect.

"For more than 53 years Sister Cities have worked to bridge cultural divides and advance mutual understanding between communities," said Patrick Madden, President and CEO, Sister Cities International. "President Obama comments at his town hall meeting in Shanghai, China reinforce the importance and impact of SCI's network."

Sister City Commission Updates

The Commission reviewed a request from Subjang Jaya, Malaysia to form a sister city relationship with Wilmington. The twinning sub-committee used the new tool and criteria approved by Council at its August meeting. Subjang Jaya has a population of 400,000 + and is 70 sq. km. State Assemblyman, Hannah Yeoh visited Wilmington while traveling to the US last year. The review committee gave it a favorable rating with a score of 150 out of 200. The Commission will vote on whether to recommend a twinning between the two cities at its January meeting.

Mayor Bill Saffo extended an official invitation to the city government of Dandong to attend the 2010 Azalea Festival, which has been accepted. The SCC will begin work in the coming weeks to plan an

itinerary for the Dandong delegation during their visit to Wilmington.

Terry donates painting to say thank you

DONCASTER artist Terry Chipp has donated one of his best paintings to Doncaster Royal Infirmary as a thank-you for helping him in his battle with cancer. Terry was all set to fly out to America to spend time at the No Boundaries International artists' colony in Wilmington, North Carolina, USA, last October until he was diagnosed with cancer six months earlier.

He thought he wouldn't be able to take up the opportunity – but the DRI's doctors completed his treatment in time for him to go.

A year to the day that he flew out to America, Terry donated a painting of Captain Charlie's cottage on Bald Head Island where the artists' colony was based.

The No Boundaries colony is arranged every two years by three artists in Wilmington – Doncaster's twin town. It gives established artists the opportunity for two weeks, uninterrupted painting.

Terry went for three weeks, made up of two weeks

painting the scenery and half a week before and after, staying with other artists. Terry was joined by 11 artists from 10 countries. At the end of the trip, all the paintings were put in an exhibition in Acme Studios and Gallery in Wilmington.

Since his trip to America, Terry has opened a new studio near Doncaster town centre above the Brevon Art Gallery, in Bass Terrace, Thorne Road with regular open studio days and has launched a website, www.terrychipp.co.uk
